Woodland Red Fox Pattern

★ Skill: Easy

✏ Size: 5–8 inches

🪡 Hook: 3.25 mm

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About This Pattern: This is a premium digital PDF pattern for the *Woodland Red Fox Pattern* crochet project. All instructions are written in US terminology. This pattern is suitable for Easy crocheters and includes step-by-step instructions, photos, assembly guidance, and a full troubleshooting FAQ.

Materials & Tools

Yarn

- ▶ Main Color: Rust Orange Worsted Yarn
- ▶ Accent: Contrasting color for details
- ▶ Eyes: 12mm black safety eyes
- ▶ Estimated Yardage: 80–160 yards total depending on colors

Recommended Hook

- ▶ Primary Hook: 3.25 mm
- ▶ Tapestry / Yarn Needle: Size 13–16 blunt tip
- ▶ Optional: Ergonomic grip handle for comfortable crocheting

Additional Supplies

- ▶ Polyester fiberfill / Toy stuffing
- ▶ 12mm safety eyes (check pattern notes)
- ▶ Stitch markers (at least 2)
- ▶ Scissors
- ▶ Straight sewing pins
- ▶ Row counter (optional)

Finished Size

5–8 inches (12–20 cm) tall when seated

Gauge

Not critical. Use a smaller hook than recommended (go down 0.5mm) for tighter fabric.

Stitch Abbreviations (US Terms)

All patterns are written in US crochet terminology.

MR**Magic Ring***Start: 6 sc in MR***ch****Chain***ch 12 to begin***sl st****Slip Stitch***Join with sl st***sc****Single Crochet***sc in each st***hdc****Half Double Crochet***hdc in next 4 sts***dc****Double Crochet***dc in each st around***tr****Treble Crochet***tr in 5th ch from hook***inc****Increase (2 sc in 1 st)***(sc, inc) repeat***dec****Invisible Decrease***dec 6 times (12→6)***BLO****Back Loops Only***sc in BLO around***FLO****Front Loops Only***sc in FLO around***FO****Fasten Off***FO, leave 10" tail*

TIP

The Invisible Decrease (dec): Insert hook under front loop of first stitch AND front loop of second stitch. Pull through both loops (3 loops on hook). Pull yarn through all 3 loops in one motion. This creates a seamless decrease that won't leave visible holes.

Pattern Notes



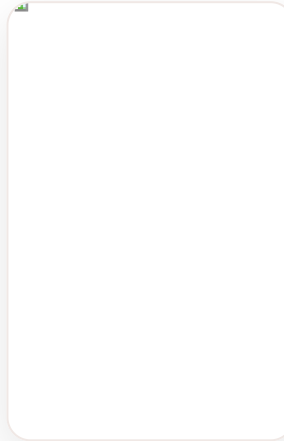
Construction Notes

- ▶ This Woodland Red Fox Pattern pattern is worked in continuous rounds (spiral) unless otherwise noted.
- ▶ Do NOT join at the end of each round unless the pattern specifically instructs you to.
- ▶ Use a stitch marker to mark the beginning of each round.
- ▶ All stitch counts are shown in parentheses at the end of each round, e.g., (18).
- ▶ All pieces are worked from the top down unless otherwise stated.

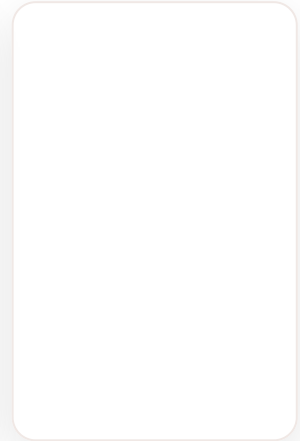


Yarn & Hook Notes

- ▶ Recommended yarn: Rust Orange Worsted Yarn
- ▶ Recommended hook: 3.25 mm
- ▶ For amigurumi: Use a hook 0.5mm smaller than label recommends for tighter tension.
- ▶ Cotton yarn gives the crispest stitch definition.
- ▶ Chenille/velvet yarn creates the fluffiest look but hides stitch detail.

⚠ NOTE

If this item is intended for children under 3 years old, replace safety eyes with embroidered eyes for safety. Do not attach any small parts that could be a choking hazard.



Parts to Make:

Body

Head

Ears (×2)

Tail

Arms/Legs (×4)

Body

Beginning of Body — Woodland Red Fox Pattern body formed and stuffed, showing rounded oval shape

With main color yarn, make a magic ring.

Rnd 1: 6 sc in magic ring. Pull ring closed tightly. (6)

Rnd 2: Inc in each st around. (12)

Rnd 3: *Sc in next st, inc in next st*, repeat 6 times. (18)

Rnd 4: *Sc in next 2 sts, inc in next st*, repeat 6 times. (24)

Rnd 5: *Sc in next 3 sts, inc in next st*, repeat 6 times. (30)

Rnd 6: *Sc in next 4 sts, inc in next st*, repeat 6 times. (36)

Rnds 7–12: Sc in each st around. (36)

TIP

 STUFFING TIP: Always stuff more firmly than you think is necessary. The stuffing compresses over time with handling.

Body (continued)

Rnd 13: *Sc in next 4 sts, dec*, repeat 6 times. (30)

Rnd 14: *Sc in next 3 sts, dec*, repeat 6 times. (24)

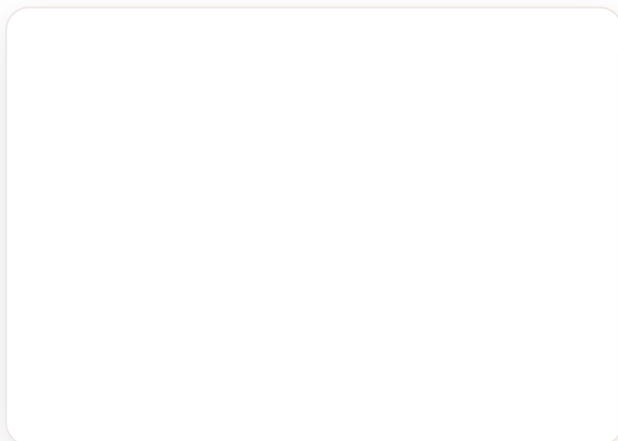
★ BEGIN STUFFING. Fill firmly with fiberfill. Continue stuffing as you close.

Rnd 15: *Sc in next 2 sts, dec*, repeat 6 times. (18)

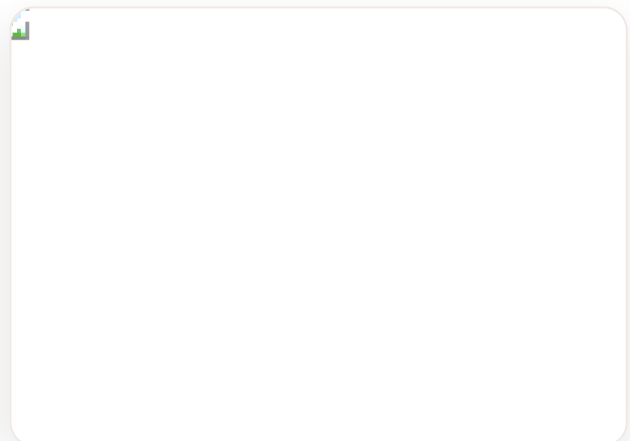
Rnd 16: *Sc in next st, dec*, repeat 6 times. (12)

Rnd 17: Dec 6 times. (6)

Fasten off, leaving a 10-inch tail. Using the tapestry needle, thread through the remaining 6 front loops and pull to close. Weave in end.

Head

Beginning of Head — Woodland Red Fox Pattern head with safety eyes positioned and locked in place

With main color yarn, make a magic ring.

Rnd 1: 6 sc in magic ring. (6)

Rnd 2: Inc in each st around. (12)

Rnd 3: *Sc, inc*, repeat 6 times. (18)

Rnd 4: *Sc 2, inc*, repeat 6 times. (24)

Rnd 5: *Sc 3, inc*, repeat 6 times. (30)

Rnd 6: *Sc 4, inc*, repeat 6 times. (36)

Rnds 7–14: Sc in each st around. (36)

TIP

 **SAFETY EYE TIP:** Always insert safety eyes BEFORE closing the head. Once stuffed and closed, you cannot reposition them easily.

Head (*continued*)

★ SAFETY EYES: Insert 12mm safety eyes between Rnds 10 and 11, with 8 sts between them. Push posts through to inside and lock with washers.

Rnd 15: *Sc 4, dec*, repeat 6 times. (30)

Rnd 16: *Sc 3, dec*, repeat 6 times. (24)

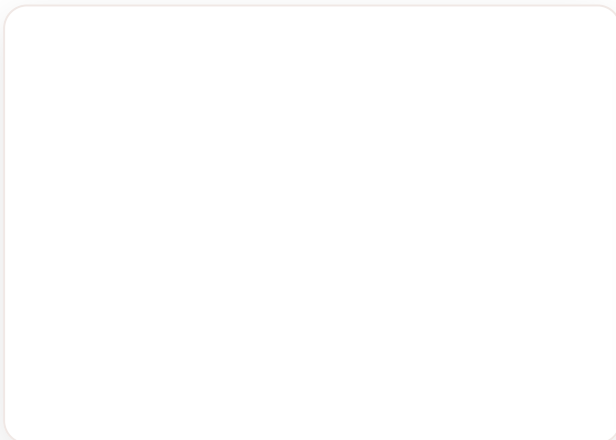
★ STUFF HEAD FIRMLY. The head should feel very solid — this supports the facial features.

Rnd 17: *Sc 2, dec*, repeat 6 times. (18)

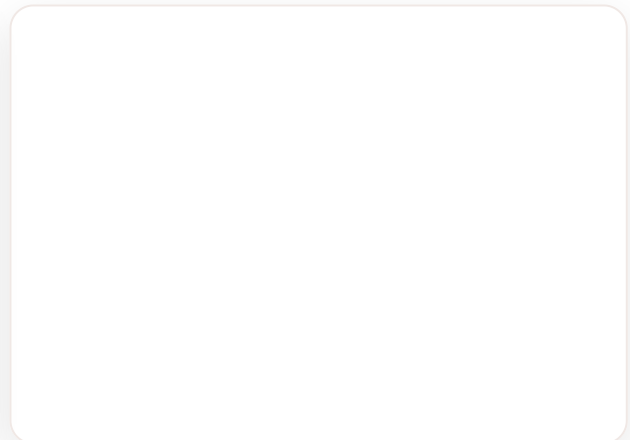
Rnd 18: *Sc, dec*, repeat 6 times. (12)

Rnd 19: Dec 6 times. (6)

Fasten off, thread through remaining loops, pull closed. Leave long tail for sewing to body.

Arms (Make 2)



Beginning of Arms (Make 2) — Both arms completed and ready for sewing to body

With main color, make a magic ring.

Rnd 1: 6 sc in ring. (6)

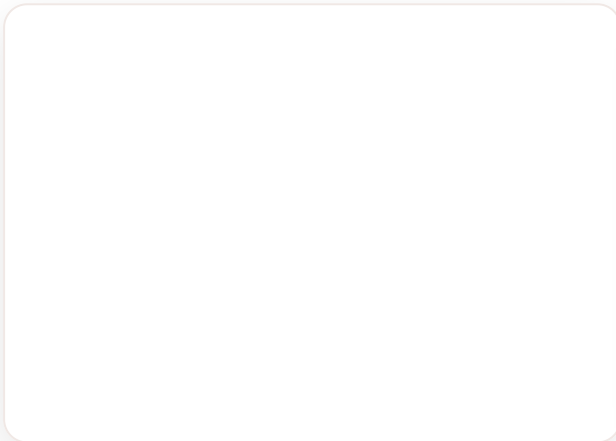
Rnd 2: Inc in each st. (12)

Arms (Make 2) (continued)

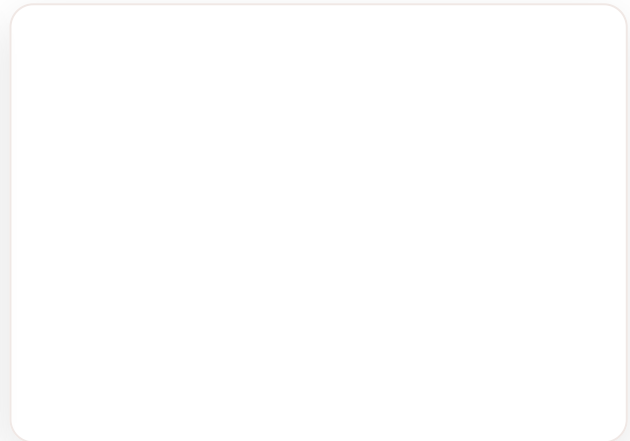
Rnds 3–8: Sc in each st. (12)

Stuff lightly — just enough to give shape.

Flatten arm across and sc through both layers to close. Do NOT close completely. Leave 12-inch tail for sewing.

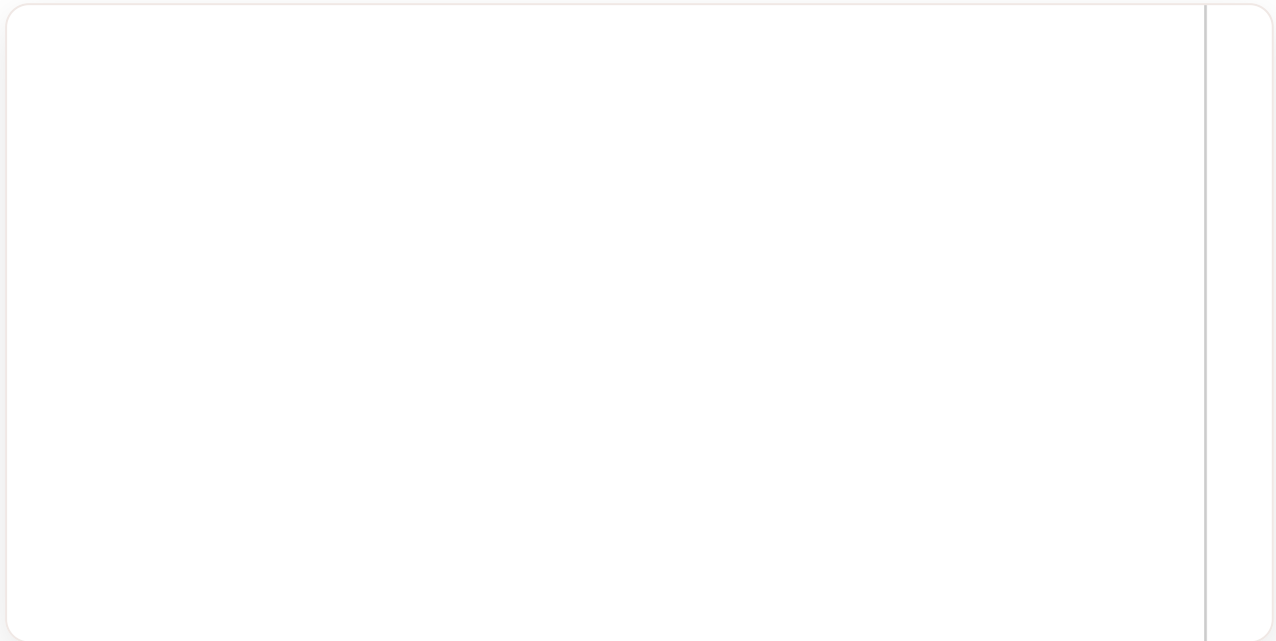


Arms (Make 2) in progress — stitch detail

Ears (Make 2)



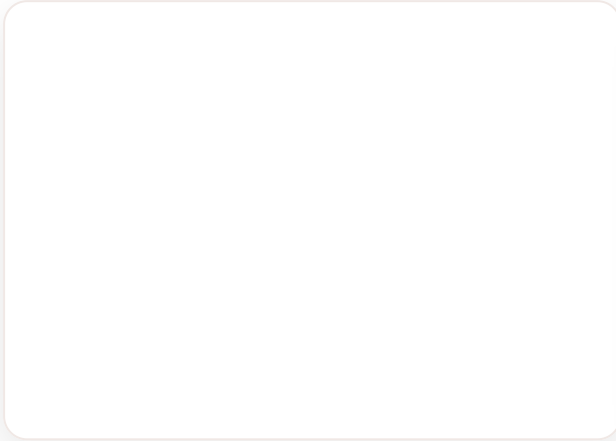
Beginning of Ears (Make 2) — Ear pairs completed and positioned for sewing

With main color, make a magic ring.

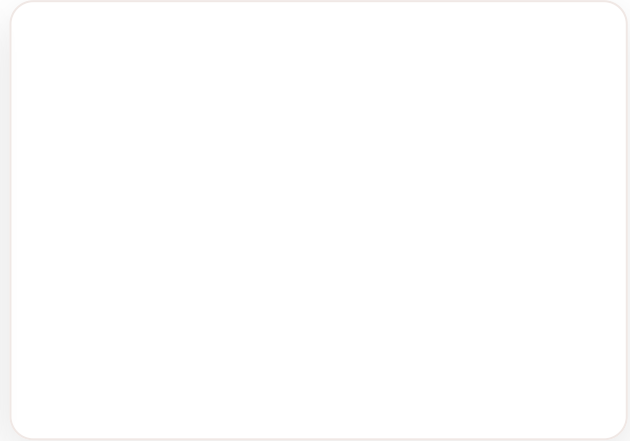
Rnd 1: 6 sc in ring. (6)

Ears (Make 2) (continued)

Rnd 2: Inc in each st. (12)

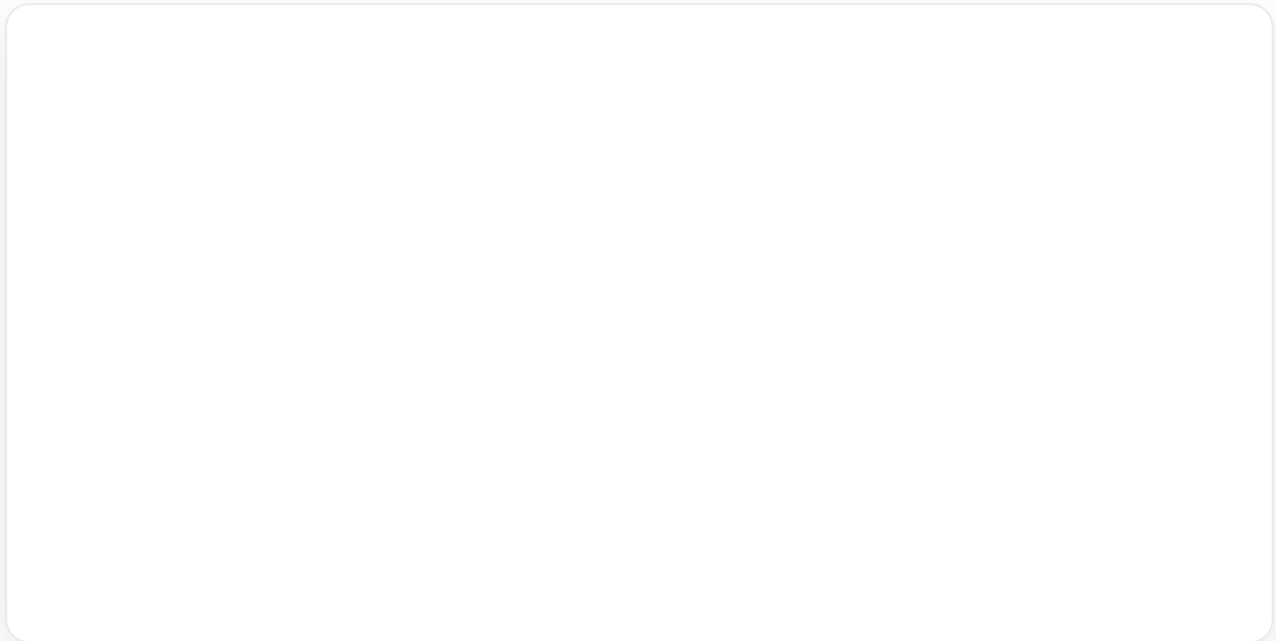


Ears (Make 2) in progress — stitch detail

Beginning of Tail — Tail formed and ready for attachment

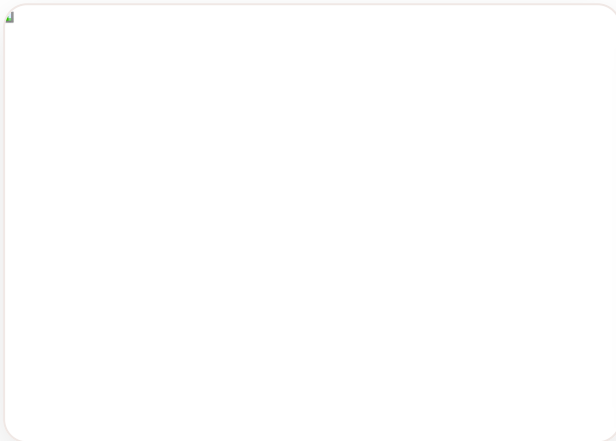
With main color, Ch 12.

Rnd 1: Sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each remaining ch. (11 sc) Join to work in rnd.

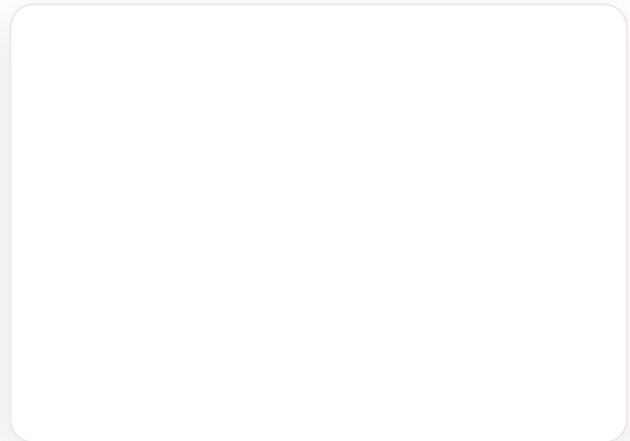
Tail (continued)

Rnds 2–6: Sc in each st. (11)

Sl st, fasten off. Leave tail for sewing.

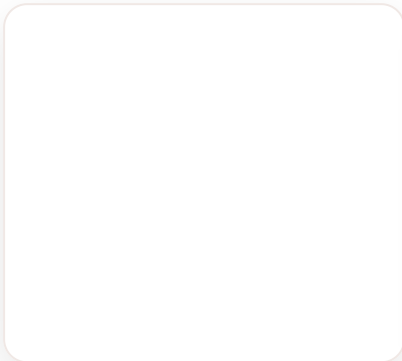


Tail in progress — stitch detail

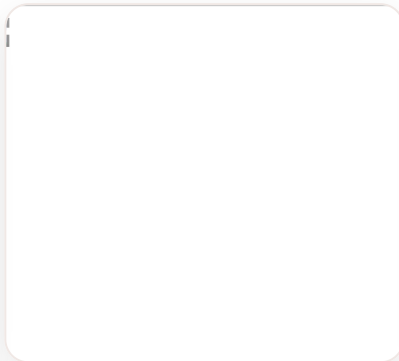


Tail completed and ready for next step

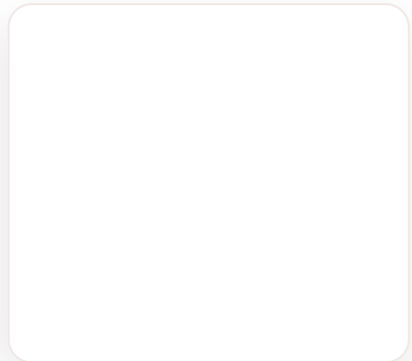
Assembly Guide

Positioning head on body



Checking symmetry before sewing

- 1 Lay all pieces out in front of you to visualize the final composition.
- 2 Position head on top of body, aligning center front. Pin with straight pins.
- 3 Using the long tail from the head, whip stitch head to body by working through the remaining open stitches of the head and corresponding stitches on the body top. Go around twice for security.
- 4 Fold each ear (for cat: pinch at base) and sew to head using the ear tail. Position ears in Rnds 1-4 area of the head, spaced evenly.
- 5 Sew arms to sides of body in Rnds 8-10 area.
- 6 Attach tail to center back of body at Rnd 3 area.
- 7 Embroider nose: With dark yarn, stitch a small triangle or "Y" shape between the eyes.
- 8 Embroider mouth: With dark yarn, stitch a curved smile below the nose.
- 9 Weave in all remaining ends securely.

TIP

Pin all pieces in position before sewing a single stitch. Take a photo of the layout, then step

back and check symmetry from a distance. This prevents the frustration of having to unpick assembled pieces.

Finishing Techniques



Weaving In Ends

- ▶ Thread the yarn tail onto a tapestry needle.
- ▶ Insert the needle through 3–4 stitches in one direction.
- ▶ Reverse direction and weave through 3–4 more stitches.
- ▶ Give the yarn a gentle tug to set it. Trim close to the fabric.
- ▶ Never cut the yarn too close — leave at least 2mm to prevent unraveling.



Invisible Closure

- ▶ Thread remaining 6-stitch tail onto tapestry needle.
- ▶ Insert needle through the front loop of each remaining stitch, going around the entire opening.
- ▶ Pull firmly to gather all loops together.
- ▶ Take one stitch across the closing point and pull through to reverse side.
- ▶ Weave in end through 4–5 internal stitches to secure.

TIP

For blocking: If your finished piece is cotton yarn, wet block it by soaking in cool water, pressing gently in a towel, then reshaping and pinning to final measurements. Allow to dry 12–24 hours for the best result.

Care Instructions



Washing

Hand wash gently in lukewarm water with mild detergent. Avoid wringing or twisting. For machine-washable yarn (check label), use a delicate cycle in a mesh laundry bag.



Drying

Lay flat to dry on a clean towel, reshaping while damp. Avoid direct sunlight to prevent color fading. Never tumble dry — this may cause felting or shape loss.



Spot Cleaning

For small stains, use a damp cloth with a tiny amount of mild soap. Dab gently — never rub. Allow to air dry completely before use.



Storage

Store in a cool, dry place away from direct sunlight. Use breathable cotton bags — avoid plastic which can trap moisture. Keep away from moths.

Customization & Variations

Color Variations

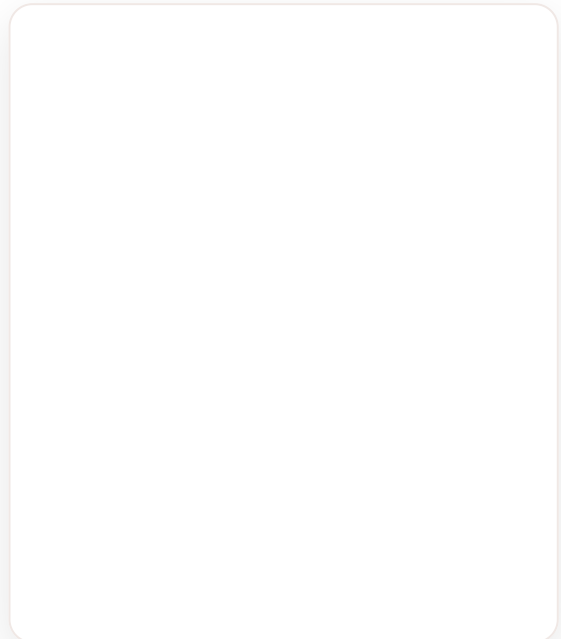
- ▶ Make a Woodland Red Fox Pattern in a different color palette — try pastel rainbow or all-white for a cloud version.
- ▶ Scale up: Use bulky yarn and a 6mm hook for a jumbo Woodland Red Fox Pattern that is twice the size.
- ▶ Scale down: Use fingering weight yarn and a 1.5mm hook to make a tiny Woodland Red Fox Pattern charm for a keychain or necklace.
- ▶ Add embroidery details like blush cheeks, freckles, or patterned clothing with a sewing needle and embroidery floss.
- ▶ Try a variegated or self-stripping yarn for a completely different look with no extra work.
- ▶ Use the same pattern in holiday colors — red/green for Christmas, orange/black for Halloween.

Size Variations

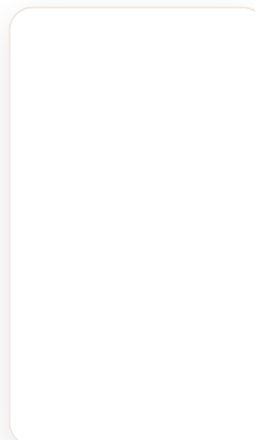
- ▶ Miniature (keychain size): Use fingering weight yarn + 2.0mm hook.
- ▶ Standard (as written): Use the yarn/hook specified in materials.
- ▶ Giant version: Use super bulky yarn + 9.0mm hook for a jumbo result.
- ▶ Adjust gauge: Going down 0.5mm in hook size reduces size by ~15%.

Yarn Substitution Guide

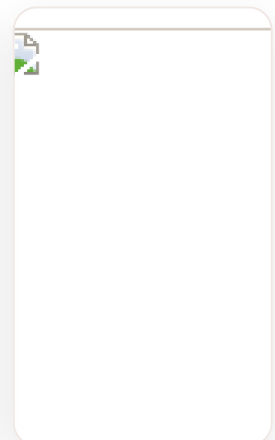
- ▶ Soft acrylic: Easy care, great for gifts, holds shape well.
- ▶ Cotton: Crisp stitch definition, great for decorative pieces.
- ▶ Chenille/velvet: Ultra-soft and fluffy, hides stitches.

- ▶ Mohair blend: Halo effect, luxurious look.
- ▶ Merino wool: Natural fiber, may require gentle hand wash only.

FAQ & Troubleshooting

Q: My magic ring keeps opening up. How do I fix it?

A: After completing Rnd 1, use your tail end to tighten the ring by pulling it firmly. Then weave the tail end through 3–4 stitches of Rnd 1 and Rnd 2 to lock it in place permanently.

Q: My rounds are spiraling. Is that correct?

A: Yes! Amigurumi is typically worked in a continuous spiral without joining at the end of each round. Use a stitch marker to mark the beginning of each round so you can count correctly.

Q: I have gaps between my stitches. How do I fix them?

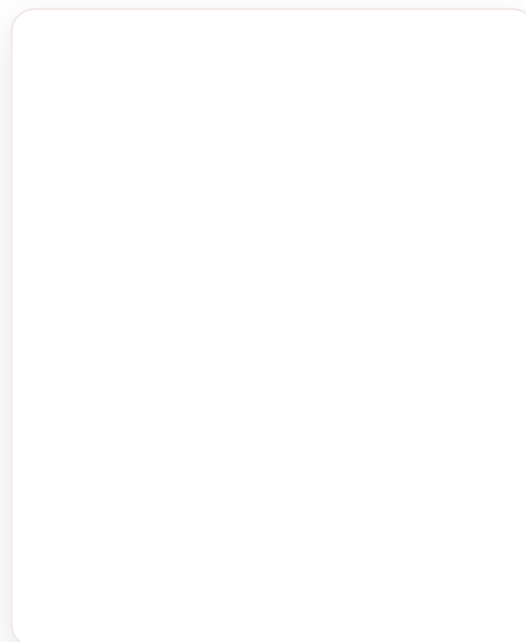
A: Use a hook one size smaller than recommended on the yarn label. For amigurumi, a 3.5mm hook with 4-weight yarn is often ideal. This creates a tight fabric that will hide your stuffing.

Q: How do I sew parts on evenly?

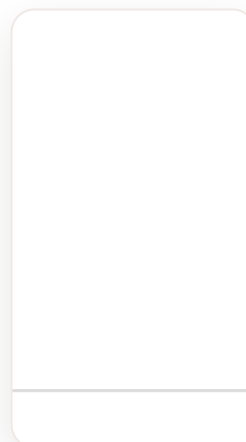
A: Always pin the piece in position first with straight sewing pins. Step back and look at the piece from a distance to check symmetry before sewing. Use a tapestry needle and the tail of the piece, stitching through both layers as you go around.

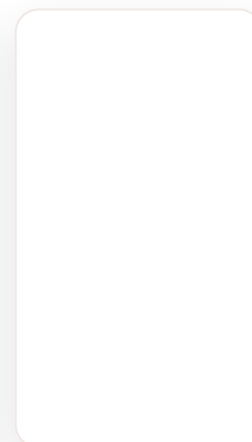

Troubleshooting reference — correct vs incorrect

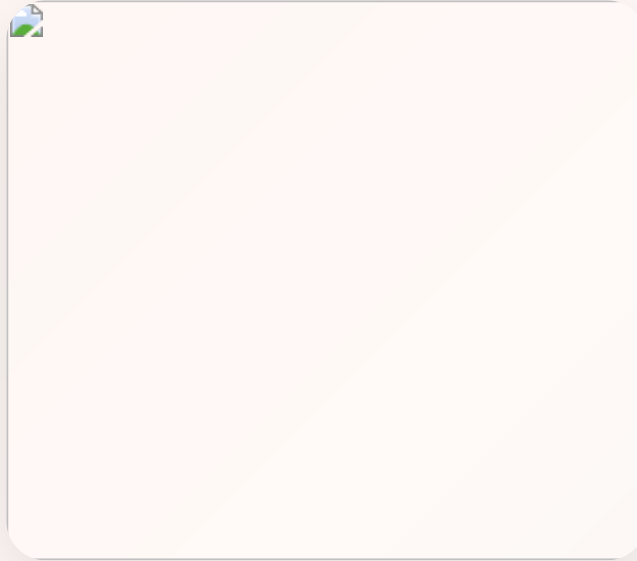


Common mistake: loose tension
